1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Basugaon is a small town under Chirang district in the state of Assam. As a matter of fact, since 1947, there was no higher educational institutions in entire area of Basugaon and this college is the first college which was established on 1st September 1986 in such a remote area of Assam under Sidhi ST LAC. The intelligentsia of Basugaon and its nearby areas, irrespective of caste, creed and community, felt the necessity of establishing this higher educational institution at Basugaon that can cater quality education not only to their children but humanity at large with special emphasis on women education.

Though the regular classes of the college were started in 1986, the formal letter of permission to start 1st year classes of TDC Arts was received by the college from Gauhati University in the session 1988-89. Later the university provided permission to start 2nd and 3rd year classes from the academic session 1989-90 and 1993-94 respectively. The college received the first Govt. concurrence w.e.f. 1988-89 and the final concurrence w.e.f. 1994-95 respectively. The college got its Temporary Affiliation from Gauhati University in the year 1993-1994 and finally got Permanent Affiliation in the year 2009-2010. Now the college is also affiliated to Bodoland University, Kokrajhar.

After so many years of consistent effort and hard work by the college community, in the year 2007 the college had been included in section 2(f) & 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956. The college was brought under Provincialized system in 2013 as per the provision of Assam Venture Educational Institutions (Provincialisation of Services) Act 2011. Though Basugaon college is an Arts College, recently in the year 2021 the Government of Assam has decided to start Science stream. The classes of B.Sc. 1st Semester gets started from the Academic Session 2023-24.

Basugaon College is situated in the very heart of Basugaon town and can easily be reached from any part of the state as well as country. It is about 7 Kms. away from its nearest National Highway 31C and 3 Kms. from the Basugaon Railway Station and 10 kms. away from New Bongaigaon Railway Junction.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- **Student-Centeredness**

One of the strengths of the college is student centeredness. The college considers every student as its valuable asset and very seriously looks into the fact that each student should get attention and importance from faculty, staff and administration.

- **Quality of Instruction**

Each of the faculty members of the college believes that one of the biggest strength of the college is its quality of education. The faculty members of this college are dedicated and highly competent and they always try their best to provide students with the best possible education, knowledge and skill they could. They accept the challenge of teaching the students who come from diverse educational and social backgrounds and take every bit of pain in moulding their personality and making them responsible members of the society with a good educational background that can enhance their reliability and possibility of self sustenance.

- **Inclusion of Department of Management and Computer Application**

In spite of being an arts college, Basugaon college is offering BBA (Bachelor of Business Administration) and BCA (Bachelor of Computer Application) programmes successfully and effectively in a very nominal fee structure. These two programmes are not offered by most of the colleges of Assam and hence Basugaon college is catering to the need of those students who want to study Management and Computer Application without going far away from their own locality due to financial hardship or other unavoidable causes.

- **Healthy and Positive work environment**

The college maintains a healthy and positive work environment. Each and every staff maintains professional ethics and follows work culture with a genuine sense of service towards the community.

- **Maintenance of Unity, integrity and Fraternity**

The college is a fertile land of knowledge and education and a microcosm of brotherhood, nationalism and

solidarity. It receives students from different caste, creed, religion and community, inculcates and develops in them a great sense of respect for other community and a strong sense of unity in diversity.

Institutional Weakness

- The college has very limited sources of income generation.
- Most of the students are from poor financial background and this affects their learning environment.

Institutional Opportunity

- The college has a strong Alumni Association and its active involvement for the wellbeing of the college can prove fruitful for the overall development of the college.
- The college has signed MOUs with other colleges and universities of state and national level for student and teacher exchange programmes, research, and employment opportunities.
- The college can offer more skill development courses to enhance students' employability.
- There is the opportunity to upgrade the certificate courses of the college into skill oriented diploma courses for better future of the students.
- College has the opportunity to work more for expanding e-learning.
- The college has the opportunity to work in the field of developing small scale and cottage industries on the basis of local resources in an innovative way.

The college has opened its science stream which will open up opportunities for students who want to pursue their education and future career in Science stream. Apart from that, the institution, in course of time, can create wide range of opportunities for scientific research and experimentation.

Institutional Challenge

- Shortage or unavailability of sufficient fund is always a challenge for which the all round development

of the college could not be achieved as desired.

- Another challenge that the college has been confronting from quite some time is the lack of proper research infrastructure due to which the college could not move forward properly in the sphere of research and development.
- Student's dropout is another major challenge of the college. The college has to face this challenge every year because most of the students of the college are from poor economic background.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Basugaon college is an affiliated college of Bodoland University under BTR in the state of Assam. Basugaon college follows the under graduate level curriculum of Arts Stream prepared by the parent University. For a smooth and systematic implementation of the Curriculum, the Academic Committee of the college prepares an Annual Academic Calendar based on the Academic Calendar of the Bodoland University. This Academic Calendar of the college is published in the Annual College Prospectus and uploaded in the college website as well as displayed on the college notice board. The Academic committee thereafter prepares a master class routine. All the heads of the departments distribute the courses of the syllabus of their respective departments amongst the departmental faculty members and prepare an effective departmental class routine. The faculty members of each department record the attendance of the students of their department in the departmental Class Attendance Register Book.

As per the guidelines of the parent university and in accordance with the academic calendar, one Sessional Examination is conducted and one Home Assignment is collected from students by each department for each semester. The Examination Committee of the college conducts the Sessional and the University Final Examinations. The faculty members of each department maintain the marks of the Sessional Examination and Home Assignment in their respective departmental progressive record books and the results and records of the Final University Examinations are maintained centrally in the office of the college.

Apart from Spoken English and Computer Courses, the college has conducted 26 number of Add-on/value-added courses in the last five years (Academic session 2018-2023) to cater to the diverse need and ability of the students as well as to make them skilled and professionals for their sustainability.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The admission process of the college is very transparent and follows the reservation policy as per government rules. The college abides by and follows the framework of the curriculum of BA, BSC, BBA and BCA course under Bodoland University.

The college encourages students to take part in class tests, group discussions, quiz, extempore speech, departmental seminars etc. so that they can be motivated and inspired and made an indispensable part in the entire teaching-learning process. These tests and seminars even help in assessing their potentials, area of

interests and drawbacks. The college even adopts strategies and methodologies to improve the slow learners as well as to encourage advanced learners.

In order to create a student centric environment and to make the teaching-learning experience more interesting, enjoyable and simplified, the college encourages the students to take part in Experimental, Participative and Problem Based learning.

The college has got thirty number of qualified and experienced faculties who are immensely dedicated towards their responsibilities and are trying hard to upgrade the entire teaching-learning process. They are using ICT and various online resources for effective teaching and at the same time acquainting students with the new dimension, prospects and role of technology in education.

The college has a very effective system of collecting feedbacks from its stakeholders like students, teachers, parents and pass out students. The feedback of employers of outgoing students who are employed in various professions/jobs are also collected and evaluated so that constant improvements and modifications can be made in the areas where there is scope and need for improvement.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Basugaon college always strives hard to create a favourable environment for research, innovation and extension activities. Faculty members are always encouraged to organize seminars and workshops in the college as well as to take part actively in National and International seminars organized by other higher educational institutions. Faculty members have even started obtaining Ph.D. degree and getting themselves involved in research activities. They are also publishing their research articles in national and international journals. The college has taken the keen initiative to publish at least one book or journal every year where the multilingual and multidisciplinary articles of the faculty members the college as well as of other higher educational institutions are published. The college organized national level Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs) in collaboration with IIT, Guwahati supported by MeitY. The college has even been organizing webinars in regular intervals where research papers are being presented by the faculties of the college as well as by the faculties of other colleges and universities on diverse, serious and current issues.

The college adopts one neighbouring village and is organizing activities and programmes there to sensitize and make the villagers aware of the serious issues and problems they have been facing. The college also adopts one neighbouring school and is trying its best for the overall development of the school through visiting classes and extension activities.

The college, through its various cells, has been organizing programmes and activities for the last few years which mostly include nature and bio diversity conservation, preservation of indigenous culture and traditional knowledge, gender related issues, women's issues, health and hygiene related issues, programmes on consumers' awareness and imparting knowledge for resolution of legal hassles, awareness about constitutional rights and so on.

The college has signed three number MOUs with reputed educational institutions and the collaborative works

are in progress.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Basugaon college spreads over an area of 4.93 acres of land with a built-up area of 5455.25 sq. meters. The college has got 19 numbers of regular class rooms with electricity and whiteboards and adequate number of desks and benches. The college offers a secured campus with RCC boundary wall, security guards and 24x7 CCTV surveillance with 15 number of CC cameras.

The college is equipped with 12 no of well-furnished departments with departmental library and computer with internet facility. The college provides students with smart and ICT enabled class room facility and separate computer laboratory with internet facility. There is Solar Energy for deduction of electricity consumption and Generators as alternate source of energy. To provide accommodation to girls who come from far off places the college has got one Girl's Hostel with 10 numbers of spacious and secured rooms along with electricity and running water, dining facilities and security measures. There are two digital classrooms with adequate ICT facilities.

The college is equipped with College Canteen, Gymnasium, Yoga Centre, Auditorium, Indoor Stadium, College Play Ground, Boy's Common Room, Girl's Common Room, Child Day Care Centre, Cycle Stand, Bike Stand, Car Parking, Filtered Drinking Water Facility, Strong Room, Store Room, Waste Management Facility, Office Room, Examination Control Room, Ramp Entry and Exit for differently able students, Flower Garden, Fruit Garden, Banana Plantation and Rain Water Harvesting System.

The college has a Central Library with 15125 numbers of books and reading facilities for students and staff along with Xerox facilities. The library offers Internet facilities, E-resources, Newspaper and Magazine, Display Board, Rare Books, Question Bank and Digital Repository (DELNET, DSPACE, NLIST, Sodhganga, NDL) etc.

Student Support and Progression

The college takes ample measures and initiatives for students' support and progression. The college has an active Student's Union and various Cells and Committees under IQAC through which the college channelizes the students to take part in various activities and programmes. Besides, a student feedback system always remains active in the college to collect the feedback of students and to take immediate measures for any of their grievances or issues.

As far as practicable, the college looks into all the diverse areas which can prove helpful for the necessary support the students can avail off and the progression they can attain. Thus apart from the scholarships provided by the Government, the college has been providing free ships to the students belonging to BPL Category under a scheme of the Government of Assam.

In order to improve sustainability and ascertain job infallibility, the college, in each academic session, through

its various departments, has been offering the students skill enhancement and value-based add-on courses.

There are various Cells and Committees like Anti-ragging and Sexual harrassment Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell etc. which constantly monitor and keep tract of the various issues and grievances of the students and try to redress of those grievances at the earliest convenience.

There are Sport and Cultural Cells under the IQAC of the college which organize various games and sports competitions and cultural activities and thereby create platform for the students to identify their talent and inspire and promote them to fulfil their dreams and ambitions.

The college organizes career counselling and personality development programmes in regular intervals to improve the overall personalities of the students. The college has its Red Ribbon Cell, Women Empowerment Cell and NSS Unit which, through their events and programmes, always try to provide students with the necessary help and benefit and infuse in them the much needed sense of compassion, fellow-feeling, solidarity, unity and nationalism.

The college has an active Alumni Association that keeps an eye on the various activities of the college and remains ever ready with its necessary help and suggestions as and when required.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Basugaon college is a well governed institution. The college maintains a systematic structure of a well managed organizational hierarchy that supports and properly manages the process of decentralization and effective decision making, policy evolving and strategy development of the college. The college functions in compliance with the direction and the norms of all its statutory bodies and it has crafted effective welfare measures for its teaching and non-teaching staff. The college works for developing human resources and to achieve this end it distributes the responsibilities to the heads of departments and to its committees and cells involving teaching, non-teaching staff and student representatives. The college has introduced e-governance in admission, examination and in finance and accounting. The college also encourages the teaching and non-teaching staff to upgrade their knowledge, skill and competency. They are always inspired and motivated to attend Faculty Development Programmes and participate in seminars, workshops, short-term and other skill enhancement courses. The college has a mechanism for internal and external financial audits. The college infuses team spirit and co-operation amongst the students which is evident in College Week and in various programmes and events of the college and in the departmental activities. The Students' Union Body of the college ensures the full participation of the students in various activities.

The college follows all the rules and guidelines of its parent university, UGC and State Government for

The Governing body of the college supervises the smooth functioning of the administrative and academic well being of the college. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Students are encouraged to undergo minor/major projects on diverse issues and topics by those departments where project works are needed. The college offers Spoken English and Computer Application certificate courses. The college offers add-on courses on multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary topics and skill-based subjects through its departments. The college has signed MOUs with two higher educational institutions and the faculty exchange as well as the sharing and exchange of knowledge on diverse areas with these higher educational institutions are going on strategically.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The college has not yet registered under ABC but will do so as soon as it gets order or instruction from its parent university.
3. Skill development:	The college offers SECs (Skill Enhancement Courses) through all departments as included in the syllabus prepared by the parent University. The College offers Spoken English Course as an important skill development course which can enhance the English language skill of the students. The college has constantly been motivating its students to get enrolled in the online courses conducted under MOOC, edX, Coursera etc. The college is even considering the inclusion of certain online courses as its add-on skill development course at the earliest convenience.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The College has been organizing workshops on Indian culture and tradition, traditional Indian music and dance, traditional Indian food etc. In order to make students realize the importance of Indian regional languages, the college offers Assamese, Bodo and Bengali as MIL subjects and the students offering these subjects are taught in their respective regional languages. To promote regional Indian languages and to familiarize students with the vast and rich source of the history and literary activities of these languages, the Assamese, Bodo and Bengali departments have been organizing their departmental seminars and observing significant days and events in regular intervals. The college has even been offering add-on and certificate courses on Indian Knowledge system. It has plans to introduce online courses on Indian Language, culture and tradition in the near future.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	To emphasize on outcome based education, the college has already started two courses namely 'Spoken English' and 'Computer Application'. It has plans and vision to incorporate more such courses from the coming academic year where focus will mainly be on outcome based education.
6. Distance education/online education:	The college is planning to offer certificate and degree programmes through distance/online mode very soon. After having initiated from the period of lockdown, to complete the syllabus in due course of time effectively and in a student friendly manner, the faculties have been taking classes through various platforms like Google Class Room, Google Meet, etc. To make the process of teaching-learning more advanced, technology based, globally acceptable and effective, the college has added various technological tools like computers, Learning Management System, Google Workspace, LCD Projector, Interactive Display Panel, Wi-fi and so on.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

All the teachers along with conventional lecture methods, also adopted a students-centric learning approach.

Group activities like group discussion, fieldwork, excursions, project preparation, etc. are undertaken to strengthen the knowledge base of the students and also to contribute to skill development. Some new skill and personality development courses have been introduced in the college to acquaint the students with practical knowledge outside classroom teachings. Feedbacks are taken from students by teachers to develop their skills of teaching, interaction, collaboration, etc. At the same time, teachers are discouraged from giving readymade notes to students, so that they can prepare their lessons themselves.

1. Experiential Learning:

- The conventional use of laboratories by the Department of B.C.A. and psychological laboratories used by the Department of Education.
- Students learn from their experiences during activities assigned to them such as seminars on various topics, students learn from their social responsibility through participating in tree plantation programme in college, neighboring areas and adopted village.
- College is equipped with smart classroom which help them to ICT enabled class. Online classes, downloading subject related video showing to students.
- E-library facilities also help students in self learning process and enhance their knowledge.
- Field visit, industrial visit also done by each department.

2. Participating Learning:

- Students of our college actively participate in group discussion, debate and teaching in neighboring school as a part of skill enhancement course.
- Workshop on folk dance and folk instruments organized by cultural cell include participatory learning.
- Use of technology in teaching learning example- seminar, webinar, Google meet, Google classroom, you-tube also help participative learning.
- Project reports are prepared by students with real world problems which help students to interact with village people.

3. Problem based Learning:

- Online Test, MCQ, Quiz, field trip, industrial visit, is organized to student's involvement in real world problems to solve, often in a collaborative setting.
- Students join in inter-college competitions also help them to problem-based learning

Project work with data analysis of some Department also help them to problem-based learning.

Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching learning process.

The college has Digital classrooms, computer labs and Wi-Fi facility are available to take ICT classes by the faculty members. Faculty members use ICT tools. They take online classes through Google class, Google meet, Zoom apps conducted online Quiz, Assignment. They also take digital classes with the LED projector and screen. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Our institution is now under Bodoland University from 2020. As per the university rules 80 marks are allotted for the end semester and 20 marks are allotted for internal assessment.

- Institute's primary focus is on strengthening teaching learning process through rigorous assessment and evaluation. For this purpose, the college has provided guidelines for faculty to ensure transparency through notification.

- Besides the Department allot specific topics for home assignment. Departments regularly conduct seminars and quiz competitions.

- Moreover teacher of every department monitor the attendance of the students. We have separate Examination committee . Samples of questions papers displayed to students to make them familiar with the university examination pattern. Repeat test are sometimes conducted to offer the students an opportunity to improve students better performance and take appropriate remedial measures. The Departments are instructed to arrange re test for the students who have failed to appear in the internal Examination on the scheduled date due to some unavoidable circumstances.

- The Answer scripts are discussed with the students for identifying the weakness of the students. Marks are sent to the concerned University. Further the scripts are preserved for submission to the university on demand.. Students are allowed to raise their queries about the marks they have obtained in their department.

· The HOD of each department is entrusted to look into the grievances of the students with utmost care for ensuring transparency and reliability in the internal evaluation system. Education Dept have one practical paper which was conducted in presence of university appointed external from other college and for project paper external was appointed from other departments of our college. All the grievances are solved by the Department, Examination committee and Grievance Redressal Cell of the college.

· In case students found using unfair means the invigilator warns for first time but if repeated, students was expelled . Bodoland University examination process (for UG colleges) is controlled entirely at the University level.. Answer scripts are evaluated at some specific colleges under Micro-Zone level, appointed by the University. The seat plan is arranged in the examination hall for the smooth conduct of each examination. Grievances of the Students, during the conduct of the examination, are handled by the examination committee of the college. Examination related grievances, after the publication of the results, are dealt with B.U examination branch.

· Regarding the Internal Assessment related grievances (if any), the academic convenor goes through written complaint of the concerned student duly forwarded by the principal are solved at the university level. The students can approach to the university level if they are not satisfied with the decisions adopted in the institutional level. Application forwarded by principal is submitted to the controller of Bodoland university for last 3rd semester final result. There is a specific mechanism of University for re-evaluation of Answer scripts. The college provide time bound,transparent,solution for examination related grievances.

Response-

The college has clearly stated learning outcomes. In the beginning of the session the outcomes are stated in the academic meetings. The program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated at the university level after the semester end examination. The college evaluates the outcome with the help of problem solving method, industrial visit, survey, project work, field reports, laboratory practical, group discussion, excursions, etc

To make the teaching learning process more effective students feedback on teaching process are collected and evaluated for attainment of Cos and POs.

The institution depends on internal Examination and university examinations to determine outcomes of students' learning. The Academic Committee of the college regulates and collects the data of the two sessional examinations. Accordingly, the Academic Committee monitors the performance of the students and asks respective departments to take steps accordingly for overcoming low performance in specific subjects.

The institution conducts periodical internal examinations and class tests to monitor and acquire specific knowledge of the students. Thereafter performance of the students is analysed and subsequently strategies like remedial classes, surprised test, are arranged for weak students. The institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. The honours course students are given project works and assignments and emphasis is given on them to make them competent for higher studies as well as job markets. On the basis of sessional, class test performance concern department make arrangement for remedial classes for weak students.

Programme specific outcomes are measured through both academic and non-academic performances of the students. The performance of the students in the internal and external examinations, in the practical and assignments, participation in class activities, role in the departmental activities are some of the means by which programme specific outcomes are measured. Students are also encouraged to take part in quiz, seminars, Debate etc. organized by college and inter state, inter- district competitions

Evaluation of POs and Cos is an ongoing process and institution should be committed to continuous improvement based on the assessment findings. Regular reviews and adjustment help ensure that the educational program remains effective and aligned with its intended outcome.

Mechanism for redressal of grievances related to internal examinations:

We can measure students achievement of these outcome such as essay, presentation and research article. The answer scripts of the sessional examinations are shown to the students for self-evaluations. In case of any doubt regarding evaluation, the students can freely discuss their problems with the respective teachers.

This practice helps to a great extent in reducing the grievances regarding assessment of the answer scripts.

Grievances related to marks obtained by students in seminars and group discussions are solved in the class itself through open discussion among the students and the teachers.

Total attendances of the students are shown to the students as well as to their guardians, so that in case of any grievances related to marks allotted for attendance can be resolved efficiently.

In case of any grievance related to internal examination the students can also approach grievance cell for redressal of their problems.

The students can also approach their respective mentors for redressal of grievances related to internal examination.

Mechanism for redressal of grievances related to external examinations:

In case of any doubt regarding the marks obtained in an external examination a student can apply for re-scrutiny of the answer scripts in a prescribed format.

The students can also take the help of RTI (Right to Information) for redressal of grievances. For this purpose the students can approach the teachers for guidance.

The period for RTI application lasts for 1months from declaration of the result so that the students can get ample time to rectify the results.

In case the students are not satisfied with the marks after re-scrutiny, they can resort to RTI within

stipulated time.

6.2.1

Response:

The IQAC of the college in consultation with the principal and support from GB planned different plans for the upliftment of the institution. The college has one smart classroom with 100 seating capacity and three ICT-enabled classrooms. The library is supervised by the library committee. Faculty members participated in various FIP, OP, FDP, Faculty exchange programs and published research papers. It has initiated a program in the name of “Mission Green and Clean” every year. The authority has strictly maintained the campus as “Tobacco Free Zone and conducted many awareness programs. The college has adopted “Ulubari M.E. School” and Ulubari Village. The college has provided computer to each dept. with WiFi connection.

Policy Features of Governance of College and Functioning of Institutional Bodies -

College Governing Body: The college has a well-organized functional governing body having perspicacity about the future development of the college, comprising people from administration, education, industry and academy. The names of the members of the GB are proposed in the general meeting by the attending members and forwarded to and approved by the DHE, Assam.

Principal: He acts as the administrative head of the institution and is entrusted with the responsibility of managing the daily affairs of the college. He implements all the activities as per the directives of the GB. Simply, he is the caretaker of the college and its stakeholders.

IQAC: It consists of representatives from all stakeholders of the college including administrative officers, industrialists, educationists, alumni representatives etc. The cell is meant for planning, guiding and monitoring the Quality Assurance (QA) and Quality Enhancement (QE) activities of the college. It takes various measures towards academic excellence.

Head of the Department: The teaching departments of the college is headed by the HoDs.

Committees and Cells: The college administration is supported by a number of committees and cells i.e., Academic Committee, Admission Committee, CORE Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Women Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Cultural Cell, NSS and Extension Activities Cell, Career Counselling and Placement Cell, Anti-ragging and Sexual harassment cell etc. The cells and committees take pain to ensure a healthy academic environment in the institution. All are performing their activities

under the supervision of principal.

Recruitment: Regarding appointment of teaching and non-teaching staff, the GB strictly follows the rules and guidelines of the UGC and State govt. Normally, the advertisement of the post is given in local and national newspaper.

Promotion: The promotion of teaching staff is given as per UGC regulations under CAS subject to API score, self-appraisal report or PBAS. For non-teaching staff, it is done as per state govt. rules.

Service Rules: The college follows the University regulations for conducting courses, examinations etc. All employes are bound to follow the rules and regulations of UGC and state govt.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism: The college has a grievance redressal mechanism under the supervision of principal. The staff and students can submit their grievances, if any, to the cell. If the grievances are not resolved by the cell, then they can approach the Principal and GB; respectively.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The institution implements a performance-based appraisal system for assessing teaching and non-teaching staff, evaluating their annual performance in academics and extracurricular activities to gauge their overall contributions. The college governing body strictly adheres to UGC Regulations on Minimum Qualifications for Teachers and Academic Staff, including subsequent amendments, extending this commitment to both teaching and non-teaching employees. Yearly performance evaluations after one year of service aim to objectively assess and improve employees' performance while fostering their professional growth.

The key characteristics of the performance appraisal system include:

For Teaching Staff

- Faculty member's performance is evaluated through the Annual Self-Assessment within the Performance-Based Appraisal System (PBAS).
- Promotions rely on the PBAS proforma aligned with the UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS), contingent upon the API score.
- The institute assigns faculty members voluntary additional duties and responsibilities encompassing various non-academic activities, giving due recognition to these contributions in their overall evaluation.

For Non-Teaching Staff

All non-teaching staff shall undergo annual confidential reports and performance appraisals as per state govt. rules for their service and promotion.

Effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

The institution effectively implements welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff, providing access to government benefits such as Gratuity, Pension, Medical Facilities, CL, EL, maternity/paternity leave and CCL as per govt. rules.

In addition to the aforementioned, the teaching and non-teaching staff receive the following benefits.

- A Day Care Centre is available in the college for the staff.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The Principal in consultation with IQAC and its various committees/cells as well as support from the G.B. looks after the development plans, implementation, supervision and fund-raising activities. The college mobilizes funds for its regular activities and development of the college. The college sends proposals for grants to the University Grants Commission (UGC), State Government and BTC authority to meet the expenses for construction, repair and renovation of the college building and premises. Most of the funds are through Government grants (State and BTC govt.), fees collected from students for different programs, funds generated from sales of waste of the college. These funds are properly utilized for the development of the college, for buying books, journals etc., for conducting seminars and workshops, payment of salaries for non-grant faculty and staffs and are properly audited.

The funds received from the central govt. are utilized for the various development activities. The state govt. funds have been used for setting up of one smart classroom, three ICT enabled classrooms, construction of new administrative building, semi-digital library and various extension activities.

The college has a mechanism for both internal and external audit -

Internal Audit: Internal audit is a continuous process for every financial transaction, whereby

the college itself carries out the initial stage of the internal audit. In the initial stage, the local auditor

scrutinizes and verifies the financial data. This is again scrutinized by the Administrative Officer, Finance dept., Govt. of Assam and the Principal for clarity, authenticity, transparency, and financial accuracy. Income/Expenditure is closely monitored by the Principal and the Senior Asst. (Accounts).

External Audit: The external audit takes place annually after the completion of every financial year. The bills and vouchers of the expenditure are reviewed and checked by the auditor. The departmental vouchers and records of the capital expenditure is also checked and verified. Departmental Accession Register, Stock Registers/Purchase Registers are physically checked. The external/statutory audit has been completed up to the session 2022-23 and it is done by a Chartered Accountant.

 - d. IQAC monitors the holding of sessional and university examinations & its evaluation.
- 2) IQAC Institutional Review System/Mechanism:
- a. IQAC initiates academic and administrative audits every year.
 - b. It conducts green audit, energy audit and gender audit.
 - c. IQAC has introduced a feedback mechanism for the teaching learning system and on institutional performance.
- 3) IQAC Evaluation of Learning Outcome:
- Academic committee headed by the Vice Principal, looks after the Outcome Based Education in the institution. It reviews the outcomes with all departments and its faculties regularly.
- 4) Student's Feedback on Faculty, Teaching-Learning Process and Evaluation:
- Each department regularly takes feedback from the students for their respective courses, teaching-learning process and other activities of the college. During the feedback process no faculty members are involved and only students are included.

Best Practice I:

Title of the Practice:

Fostering nature care within the college premises and its immediate vicinity.

Objectives of the practice:

- Raise awareness of the value of biodiversity in the college campus and in the surrounding area.
- Create and carry out educational programs and projects that encourage environmental stewardship among the people.
- Encourage partnerships with neighbourhood associations, municipal entities, and environmental organizations to actively participate in nature conservation projects outside the college property.

Underlying Principles/Concepts:

The Basugaon college has selected this practice as one of the two best practices with the above-mentioned objectives as this place is blessed with a beautiful nature that demands our care. Preserving this natural beauty within and around the college is not merely an aesthetic choice but a social responsibility of each and every person living in the area. Accordingly, this college has been organising several awareness to raise awareness among the people.

The context:

It's been observed that there has been an alarming decrease in environmental awareness among the locals living in the vicinity of the college. In order to combat this issue, we are starting awareness campaigns that aim to reawaken the consciousness among the people of area about the environmental conservation.

The Practice:

- Plantation of saplings during various programs organised by the college.
- Distribution of free saplings to the staff, students and the local people.
- Conducting seminars to raise awareness about environmental pollution.
- Implementing stringent plastic-free rules in the college premises.
- Promoting the use of public vehicles to help reduce air pollution.

Constraints/limitations faced while executing the practice:

- Building trust and ensuring the relevance of the programs among the local community.
- The linguistic variety in the area occasionally makes it difficult to precisely convey our intended message to each community member.
- Finding and implementing eco-friendly alternatives to plastic products that are practical and affordable.
- Encouraging a shift in people's plastic bag consumption habit is challenging.

Evidence of Success:

- The saplings that were previously planted have exhibited robust growth.
- The college staff has successfully established a routine of utilizing public transportation twice a week.
- The college has demonstrably succeeded in implementing a plastic-free policy across its campus.

Problems encountered and resources required:

Problems encountered:

- Insufficient funds hinder the ability to execute these activities on a larger scale.
- Shortage of time to plan and carry out these activities in a large scale.
- The insufficiency of faculty members compared to the necessary quantity obstructs the smooth execution and monitoring of these activities.

- No credits are awarded to students and faculty members for their involvement in these activities.

Resources required:

- More funds should be allocated for executing the practice on a larger scale.
- More faculties are required so that they can also be involved in monitoring the various activities of such practices.
- A system should be established to credit the students and the faculty members for their participation in such practices.
- A separate room equipped with proper technology is required in the college premises for conducting seminars for such practices.

Best Practice II:

Title of the practice:

Promotion of tradition, culture and heritage of the locality of the Basugaon area.

Objective of the practice:

- Preserve and celebrate local traditions, culture, and heritage to instil pride in the community.
- Integrate community heritage into the college curriculum for a comprehensive educational experience.
- Encourage collaboration between the college and the local community to actively promote and sustain cultural traditions.

Underlying principle/concepts:

The Basugaon college has chosen to embrace this practice due to the rich cultural and traditional values of the area, seeking to preserve and celebrate local cuisines, music, dance, etc. as integral components of its heritage. This fosters a sense of identity, strengthens community bonds and ensures the transfer of unique practices, knowledge and heritage to future generations, thereby sustaining the community's rich history and legacy. Accordingly, the college has been taking up several initiatives to encourage the promotion of the local tradition, culture and heritage.

The context:

It has been observed by the college, there has been a declining interest and enthusiasm among the youth of the area regarding preserving their traditional and cultural values and heritage. To combat this issue, the college has been conducting several awareness programs and workshops aiming to preserve those values and heritage.

The Practice:

- Celebration of heritage festivals like Bihu, Bwisagu, etc. in the college.
- Celebration of food festival to promote traditional cuisines.
- Conducting workshops on Bihu/Bwisagu dance and music.
- Conducting cultural competitions in the college.

Constraints/limitations faced while executing the practice:

- Lack of proper infrastructure in the college campus hinders the college from conducting such workshops on large scale.
- Lack of specialized instruments or resources for certain types of workshops.
- Lack of sufficient funds to conduct the workshops and programs on large scale.
- Lack of sufficient funds to invite experts for the workshops.

Evidence of success:

- The workshop participants have acquired the skills to mentor new learners.
- The youth of the area recognize the importance of preserving and promoting traditional & cultural values & heritage.

Problems encountered and resources required:

Problems encountered:

- Limited budgets for organizing events and workshops on a larger scale.
- Shortage of time to plan and carry out these activities on a larger scale.

Introduction: Founded in 1986, the Basugaon college emerged with a mission to deliver good quality higher education to the economically & educationally disadvantaged Basugaon area of the Chirang district, Assam. It is the only institution for higher education in the Basugaon area.

Vision & Mission of the College: The Basugaon College strives to provide education that explores, challenges and grooms every aspect of the student's personality. The college not only aims for outstanding academic achievements by adopting latest teaching approaches but also takes proactive measures to enhance the physical, social, emotional, and spiritual well-being of our students.

Core values of the college: Social Responsibility stands as a paramount core value of the Basugaon college, complemented by two equally significant values: a commitment to strive for excellence and a dedication to fostering unity.

Description of the programs to encourage women's empowerment within the college and its surrounding community through dedicated initiatives, advocacy and inclusive programs: The Basugaon region, located in the Chirang district of Assam (BTR), is an economically and educationally backward region in the state of Assam. Around 90% of households in this region are dependent on agriculture for their livelihood, with a significant majority residing below the poverty line. Basugaon college is the only institution for higher education in the area. The college has felt a crucial need to uplift the status and condition of women in the area with an objective to contribute positively to their overall empowerment and welfare. It has been carefully observed by the college that most of the girls of the locality don't go for higher education nor are they found to engage in some "skill development courses". Acquiring practical skills enhances women's employability, enabling them to secure jobs or start their own businesses. This economic independence contributes significantly to their empowerment. The Women Empowerment Cell and IQAC of the college have therefore conducted several workshops for women of the locality to impart basic skills on cutting, knitting, sewing, etc. Health largely depends on the food that we consume. The Women Empowerment Cell and IQAC of the college have therefore conducted food festivals. This serves dual purposes: to raise awareness of the importance of healthy food and to show that cooking can also be taken up as a good career option. The college has also conducted a program to felicitate Miss Deepamoni Kakoti, a 4th semester student of the Basugaon college, for her outstanding achievement of getting 1st runners up in the prestigious "South East Asia Sensation 2023 Miss Beauty Contest", held in New Delhi. She was felicitated and given a check of Rs. 5000/-. This will encourage her for her future endeavours as well as give a message to the other girls that they can achieve their goals with dedication, sincerity and continuous efforts. The Women Cell in collaboration with the IQAC has also conducted awareness program in the Hekaipara village, Basugaon to create general awareness amongst the women of the village about maintenance of general health, menstruation hygiene, general cleanliness & hygiene and child care. We consider these activities as our social responsibility, which stands as a paramount core value of the Basugaon college.

Outcome of this practice: Being a college located in a backward locality of the Chirang district, Assam (BTR), the college believes that it has been successful in performing the duty of its social responsibility to a considerable extent. As a result of the programs conducted by the college for promoting and encouraging women empowerment in the college and the nearby locality, we have observed several positive changes in the women of the college and the nearby locality. An increase in the number of lady dressmakers has been observed in the Basugaon area. They are earning well and helping to run their households. There is a growing trend of women independently managing and operating restaurants and hotels in the Basugaon area. A decline in the number of absentees in the college due to menstrual cycle issues has also been observed. Increase in the number of girl participants in the various co-curricular activities is also an indication of the success of the programs we have conducted. The changes serve as motivation for us to strive for improvement and enhance our future performance.
